Key themes and feedback:



Car parking:

There is strong support to increase the number of car park spaces and to change the car park configuration. This is due to the demand for parking during peak use and concern for the safety of drivers and pedestrians. Cost and potential crowding during peak times were raised as the most common objections. Other suggestions include opening the second car park more frequently to support demand for parking, and upgrading the signage and car park markings.

Amenities:

General park users are supportive of plan to combine the two amenities buildings into one. However, some of the targeted stakeholder groups prefer two separate toilet facilities, noting it reduces crowding during organised sport training and events. Several general park users commented that the toilet facilities were usually locked during their visit.



Indoor meeting space:

Organised users of the park such as Starlight Netball Club, Pendle Hill Football Club and Pendle Hill Cricket Club would use a meeting space regularly. For general park users this option had a lower level of priority.



Storage:

Storage would be welcome and used by most sports clubs.



Lighting:

Some users of the park raised lighting of the courts, car park and cricket pitch as an issue or opportunity. Upgraded lighting should be considered in the masterplan.



Seating and shade:

Park users would like additional shaded seating areas and more trees.



Additional exercise and play equipment:

A walking/circuit track and adult exercise equipment would be supported. A bigger playground with more play equipment for a broader range of ages was suggested by parents and children using the playground.

02: Introduction

2.1 Project background

Binalong Park, located in the heart of Old Toongabbie, is a popular park for families, sporting groups and other recreational users. The City of Parramatta Council is developing a 20-year masterplan for Binalong Park as part of their commitment to the community to improve parks and recreational facilities across the local government area.

The masterplan will identify opportunities to improve the layout of recreational facilities, review existing amenities buildings, plan for future recreational requirements such as providing local meeting rooms/social spaces and guide delivery of sports fields and community assets. The delivery of this masterplan aligns with the Council's community strategic plan, the objectives of which include:

- Enable provision of infrastructure that supports healthy lifestyles, e.g. parks and sports fields, footpaths and cycleways
- · Providing the community with open spaces including playgrounds, parks and sports fields.

Binalong Park must be fit-for-purpose now and into the future. The masterplan will be shaped by the types of uses the community tells Council they need today, as well as accommodate the changing community needs expected into the future.

This report summarises the responses and outcomes from the first phase of masterplan engagement – understanding community needs.

2.2 Engagement activities and program

Between 7 December 2020 and 4 February 2021 a series of engagement activities was undertaken with the local community and stakeholders. The activities were designed to hear from users of the park and others in the community what they need the park to deliver. The table below lists the activities and their timing.

04: Intercept interviews summary

30 in-park intercept interviews were conducted with users of Binalong Park on two occasions in December 2020. Approximately half of these interviews were conducted on a Thursday afternoon predominantly with parents and their children using the playground. The remaining 15 interviews were conducted on a Saturday, half with cricket club users and half with tennis or playground users.

The themes and feedback are summarised in the tables below.

General/other

Don't change / elements that are liked

Location near the school

Could be improved / added

- · Bicycle racks ride to the park and leave your bike on a rack rather than lying on its side in the play area
- Toilets two parents noted they have to leave the park early because the toilets are closed and a child needs to
 use the bathroom

Parking

Don't change / elements that are liked

- · Parking generally adequate, can get full when the overflow parking is not open
- · Parking generally okay, but can fill up when overflow is closed
- Parents using the playground often park on the street and access the playground from the gate on Binalong Rd. Parking near the gate on Binalong Rd is usually available
- · During winter parking is okay, in summer there are no problems getting a space
- Since COVID parking demand has decreased
- · Parents not able to enter the school to pick up/drop off their kids, so more 'kiss and ride'
- More parents walking to pick up their kids

Could be improved / added

- Separate entry and exit for the car park is well supported by the community all except one interviewee supported the idea
- · Only reason not to support was due to the cost of constructing it
- One parent noted they were once locked in the carpark. They were able to find someone to unlock the gate quite quickly.

Safety / security

Don't change / elements that are liked

Cutting the hedges around the outside of the park was the best thing Council ever did. Significantly improved
the feeling of safety, and 'dodgy' things happening in the park.

Could be improved / added

- There are lots of magpies in Spring, some can be quite aggressive in their swooping
- Some 'dodgy' people hang around in the carpark it would be better if the car park was moved further away from the playground for this reason.

Toilets

Don't change / elements that are liked

· Don't move the tennis/playground toilet facilities. Parents of small children need the toilets nearby

 Central amenities block may get congested if being used by sports clubs, tennis club and playground users at the same time.

Could be improved / added

- Generally a bit shabby
- · Needs better signage
- · Kids have fallen down the steep staircase of the playground amenities building.
- If tennis/playground amenities building is removed there needs to be a clear, accessible, safe walkway from the tennis courts to the central building. Safe enough for kids to walk by themselves.
- · May need to improve sightlines from the playground to the amenities building.
- "I live nearby, so can travel home to go to the toilet but that is very annoying, especially when there are two toilets right here in the park"

Playground

Don't change / elements that are liked

- The amenities block near the playground acts as an informal playground for some kids to climb and play on.
- Water station that was added to the playground was a great improvement.

Could be improved / added

- Playground could be larger very busy after school on some days
- The park doesn't cater to a wide variety of ages mainly low primary school age.
- Not safe for very young kids, lots of trip and fall hazards (especially the rock garden in the centre of the playground)
- Not interesting for older kids
- A big water park or water integrated into the play equipment (water obstacle course)
- A trampoline
- Tunnel and a kids cubby house (in the green areas)
- A separate play area or more equipment for smaller/younger children (e.g. preschool age)
- More swings (lots more swings) of varying types and sizes for different ages, e.g. swings for babies
- Higher fences around the park so kids can't climb over them, and some improved safety around the pole near
 the gate and the trees in the play area (e.g. timber cladding to stop kids climbing the trees example given of
 Reynolds Park)
- A big long metal slide
- · A slide for babies
- A sandpit
- More trees
- Fix up the unused spaces within the play area (especially in the corners) with additional play equipment
- Something to ride bikes and scooters on/around
- A climbing rope
- · More bubblers with better plumbing comment that sometimes the water comes out brown
- Toilets that are open they need a code to get in and no one knows what it is
- Better maintenance gates sometimes get stuck

Adult exercise equipment / Circuit track

Could be improved / added

- An exercise place for parents was supported by numerous interviewees in particular, parents of children who attend Toongabbie Public School
- A circuit track was support by many interviewees, including members of sports organisations. They didn't feel the walking track would detract from the sports fields.
- · Add adult exercise equipment close to the playground for adults to work out while they can watch kids
- Adding a volleyball net, or polls for a net: There is a group of 20 people that have been playing every week for the last 5 years. Typically on Sunday from 2 or 4pm, for 3-4 hours.

Shade / seating /BBQs

Don't change / elements that are liked

- · BBQs don't fit in with the use of the park
- Given the history of the park, they may get vandalised.

Could be improved / added

- · Seating and shade is needed. Not many places to sit out of the sun, in particular on cricket field 3.
- · Parents often sit around the main amenities building, far away from their children's cricket games

Sports facilities

Don't change / elements that are liked

· Cricket nets are well used

Could be improved / added

- Suggestion to add a cricket training pitch additional hard surface to practice, that doesn't need to be a full field to play games.
- · Parent left the Colts cricket club because the cricket pitch was low quality and always flooded
- Some people are good about sharing cricket nets with another user taking turns at using it. Others treat it as first come first served.
- Suggest prominent signage to promote sharing.

05: Online survey results

A survey was shared with local residents and users of the park between 7December 2020 and 4 February 2021. In total 374 surveys were completed, with 341 received online and 33 hardcopies. There were some minor variations between some questions online and via hardcopy. These have been accounted for and noted throughout the following results.

4.1 Survey respondent demographics

Survey participants were asked three questions to establish their use of Binalong Park. Responses showed most people visit the park several times per week, live nearby, and drive their car or walk to the park. The responses to each question are shown in figures 1-3 below.

Figure 2 Responses to survey question: How do you get to Binalong Park? (Not included in hardcopy survey)





Figure 3 Responses to survey question: What is your relationship with Binalong Park? (Not included in hardcopy survey)



4.2 Availability of car parking

As shown in figure 2, 48% of survey respondents drive to Binalong Park. Most noted they could usually find a space in the dedicated car park or on the nearby streets, though 56 of responses noted they struggle to find any parking.

Survey participants made additional comments on parking at Binalong Park. The common themes among participants were:

• Parking congestion and overflow of cars during sporting events. Suggestions included more parking spaces and opening the second car park during these events.

- Confusion about car park markings and signage. It was commented that drivers do not use the entry
 and exit to the car park properly, and that maintenance to the pavement and new painted lines would
 be encouraging.
- Safety: lack of safe pedestrian crossings and signage to ensure safety, especially for children, as well as poor lighting at night during sporting events.
- Absence of traffic flow management. There is difficulty amongst drivers coming and going out of the car
 park, parking on the street when the lot is full, and lack of visibility when attempting to leave the car
 park.

Following is a sample of comments received:



More parking required. Or at least access to all the parking all the time by removing emergency gate that blocks of half the parking, particularly for school pick up.

It can be dangerous at night when netball and soccer training is happening it is not lit up enough and worried children will get run over.

It's a bit hard getting out of parking when there are lots of cars parked in the street too - it's a bit hard to see oncoming cars.

If I don't find a slot in the car park, I can certainly park in the adjacent parking area or along Binalong Road. Please don't waste public money on renovating car parks.

4.3 Relocating and reconfiguring the courts and the car park




Figure 5 Responses to survey question: The car park at Binalong Park separates the basketball/netball courts from the tennis court and playground. Council is considering grouping the courts in one location within the park to improve sight lines and vehicle entry/access. Do you agree with this idea for improvement?

The next survey question noted that the carpark at Binalong Park separates the basketball/netball courts from the tennis court and playground. Council is considering grouping these courts in one location within Binalong Park to improve sight lines and vehicle entry/access. Survey respondents were asked if they agreed with this idea. 83% of respondents agreed with this suggestion as shown at Figure 5.

Reasons given for not being in favour of this proposal were:

- The expense/cost of this change;
- Crowding of court areas / too many people and the potential for noise impact on one set of courts from another (e.g. on a tennis match when basketball or netball is being played);
- Separate car parks avoid crowding and enable separated flow of people and traffic;
- There is sufficient street parking already; suggestions of guardrails to demarcate parking and pedestrian or play areas;
- Parking would be further away from the school, making it more difficult for students on hot/wet days;
- The courts would be unavailable during the construction period / construction impacts;
- Impacts to existing trees;
- · Retain the existing number of courts;
- Impact to accessibility, e.g. additional walking distance from car park to recreational activities for elderly or disabled;
- Concerns for safety and conflict between user groups/different ages.


Those in favour did note the improved safety this option could offer, while others commented that more parking was needed. One respondent suggested using the netball/basketball court for parking. Some commented they did not understand what was proposed and would like to see a drawing/plan. One respondent noted to keep the active areas away from residents.

Additional facilities suggested include: more and better cricket nets and practice areas; more spectator seating; more bins; less areas taken up by sheds; more slides and flying fox for children; better lighting for tennis and netball courts; four netball courts with tall fencing; more tennis courts with plexi cushion surface; increase number of disabled parking spots; and an indoor basketball/volleyball court.

4.4 Amenities buildings

Online survey respondents were asked about their support for the option to consolidate the two existing amenities buildings into a new centrally located single amenities building to service the sporting facilities, courts and playground. 83% of respondents were in support of this option.

Survey respondents were able to provide additional comments about the amenities buildings via a comments box. Key themes in the comments were:

- A single central amenity block will save space in the park and make more room for future builds and playground for children. The amenity building would need be central, easily accessible, and that as long as the scheduling of sporting events and activities was managed it would benefit the community.
- A new building will encourage and reassure users that maintenance is completed on a regular basis.
 Respondents commented that the current amenity buildings were old, outdated, and unclean.
- Better value for the park this is considered for both the local community and government land use.
 Consolidating the buildings will create better and newer facilities, would make the space more user friendly, foster and grow community relationships, and creating an overall advantage to the current land use.

Following is a sample of comments received:



Frees up space for ground. Could consider multi-purpose clubhouse, including a canteen and function area. The freed up space could also help include additional crickets nets practice areas.

Ideally all clubs could share one major, improved, state of the art sports building. Funding could be compiled for better lighting, meeting room facilities for all clubs to use, kitchenette, a projector/ tv to display presentations for meetings and training for coaches and umpires, individual club storage facilities for equipment, upgraded amenities, notice boards and signage areas for clubs that use the ground


There will be less space taken by buildings and all will be in one space. However, toilets will need to cater for mums with children and babies including feeding area.

The tennis one is usually locked anyway. It makes sense to consolidate these amenities as long as there access after school hours so the children could use. It would be also be useful to have a unisex toilet so that parents could supervise young children while they go to the toilet

I don't think you need a new amenities block, just one that is open for people using the playground to access. Toilet access for kids and families is desperately needed.

Hardcopy surveys did not include this question, however respondents to hardcopy surveys were asked if they used the amenities near the sporting fields or at the tennis courts. Most respondents indicated they did not use either bathroom at the park. Those that did generally used the bathrooms near the sporting fields. Most feedback indicated that the bathrooms were often locked when they used the park.




4.5 Facilities

Online survey respondents were asked to indicate which facilities they currently use when they visit Binalong Park. The top responses were, in order:

- 1. Playground
- 2. Toilets
- 3. Open space for unstructured recreation such as walking, jogging and relaxing
- 4. Soccer fields
- 5. Picnic tables
- 6. Tennis courts

Survey respondents were asked to rank in priority order some of the improvements being considered by Council. Online survey respondents were provided with six options while hardcopy survey respondents had five options. Rankings have been developed separately for the different survey types to account for the variation in options. Rankings were established using a point system based on the priority/preference given by each survey respondent. Note the option to merge the overflow carpark was not offered as an option on the hardcopy survey.

The rankings from highest priority to lowest were:

- 1. More trees around seating areas
- 2. A circuit track for walking around the park perimeter
- 3. Adult exercise equipment
- 4. BBQs and picnic areas
- 5. An indoor community meeting space
- 6. Merging the overflow carpark

4.6 What people love about Binalong Park and what needs to be improved

Survey respondents were offered the opportunity to provide a free text answer about what they love about Binalong Park as well as what they would improve.

Responses were grouped into four main themes:

- Access to sporting activities: sporting events and courts in Binalong Park are important for the local
 community. The space allows for multiple sports to be played at once, with courts and pitches for sports
 like tennis and pickleball, netball, basketball, soccer and cricket. The popularity of the tennis courts was
 particularly referenced.
- The opportunity for families to play: families like to use the park together, and it is a great space that fosters community. The park has facilities for children of all ages, with responses praising the number of activities that inspire children to play, and the fencing for safety to ease parents and caregivers
- The location makes it access for the community: respondents noted they can walk to the park, with the locality creating easy access for local residents and visitors alike. The responses that referenced how close to home the park is was mentioned several times.
- Overall use of space: The size of the space, the use of trees and green space, and the children's play area are stated in their comments. Community members enjoy the open space of the park, the shade over the play areas, and children being able to enjoy the park and run around.

Following is a sample of comments received:



It's large and that allows me to enjoy it for many activities, even just to escape from the house some days and take a break. It's great because it doesn't cost me money to enjoy it and I don't have to travel far to enjoy an open space.

It is a great community space. My children have used the cricket, soccer and tennis facilities and it is part of the community. It is engrained in the local Toongabbie community.

Lived nearby 46 years, have often taken my 3 children and 8 grandchildren to the playground for play & activities.

Big space to walk and run. Cricket and soccer games are good here. Hiring tennis courts is easy and affordable. Netball rings have been good too. My family has used this park for all these reasons regularly over many years.

Survey respondents were asked what improvements they would like to see in Binalong Park. Responses are grouped into three main themes:

- Increase in existing activities and infrastructure to accommodate population growth. This included more trees, more parking and more play equipment. Respondents noted
- Maintenance for current equipment and facilities. Suggestions included drainage, upgrades to the existing buildings, better fencing, and better lighting.
- New amenities. This included additional sporting activities, a café for families, new safety measures, relocating courts or goal posts.

Following is a sample of comments received:



I think the park generally is under utilised, with exception of the sporting fields. The amenities building is under-utilised, the car park is patchy and the netball courts, tennis courts and playground are located all over the place. Without looking to reconstruct the entire park, I'd consider replacing the netball courts with parking, putting in trees and a walking track around the main oval. BBQ/picnic areas could be installed on the hill next to the canteen.

More covered seating areas. Toilet facilities available every day for people using park and passers by, say 5-7 daily.

The cricket nets do need some major upgrades. The exposed concrete means all the ball get ruined really quickly and it is damaging to the bowler running on the concrete. Plus the concrete is not flat and ball can take off from the cracks and hit people a lot. It was only like the other day my mate got hit by a returning ball in the head.

Indoor sports facility - like tennis, badminton, table tennis, etc. so that community can use facilities, irrespective of weather.

A cafe would be fabulous. The park / cafe combination is something our community is seriously lacking. It would make it even more of a meeting point.

Secure on-site storage for pickleball nets and equipment, light coverage for tennis courts need to extend beyond tennis baselines so that the full pickleball courts are lit for night time games, and additional pickleball courts to accommodate growing sport in the area/community.

4.7 Additional comments

An open ended question of the survey asked participants to leave comments, questions, or concerns not addressed in the survey. Several respondents noted the improved management of Binalong Park in recent years and were pleased the park upgrade was being considered. Others made suggestions for additional upgrades such as more tennis courts, cricket nets, water play, a skate park, and accessibility for all users.

Following is a sample of comments received:



Binalong is one of my favourite parks around the Parramatta area and is a really great community hub. My major concern is the lack of cricket nets as they do not accurately represent the demands of locals who are passionate about cricket...

The management of the park has improved tremendously over the past few years

Many elderly people use the park, their mobility needs should be considered.

More tennis courts please

I would like to Binalong Park to be inviting and well presented for the community to be proud of and for other people in different communities to come and visit and enjoy the space and facilities

I would really love to see a few small water activities incorporated into the playground design.
